Electronic health records (EHR) technology enables private practices, hospitals, and healthcare systems to create a more patient-centric care model, improved workflow processes, and elevated levels of interoperability between healthcare providers and payors.

For private practices, an effective and comprehensive EHR platform can streamline charting workflow processes, driving productivity across your medical office.

The Evolution of EHR Technology and Adoption

EHR solutions have been around for quite some time. The earliest iterations of EHR systems developed during the 1960s, but widespread adoption has only happened in the past decade. According to the Office of the National Coordinator for Health IT (ONC), less than 20% of office-based physicians had implemented a certified EHR solution in 2008.¹

As a result of government policies—and the growing need to bridge the gap between healthcare providers, payors and hospital systems—EHR adoption rates have steadily increased during the last decade. By 2015, the 2008 paradigm flipped and nearly 80% of office-based physicians had implemented an EHR system.

In recent years, EHR solutions have benefited greatly from technological advancements, giving private practices of all sizes highly innovative EHR to enable the physician to prioritize patient care while driving efficient workflow processes across their medical office.



The difference between EHR & EMR

While the terms electronic medical record system and electronic health record system are often used interchangeably, they are two different types of systems. Electronic medical records typically refers to the internal patient records that are kept within a health system or practice.

For example, mental health EMR software only contains the electronic medical records within the practice. An OB/GYN EMR does not connect to other healthcare providers like an EHR can.

Additionally, ophthalmology or physical therapy EMR software only work with the EMR systems and cannot access other practice software, which limits the use of the EMR software.



How an EHR System Enables More Efficient Charting Workflow Processes

Effective charting workflow processes are the key to successful EHR implementation. Here is a quick overview to demonstrate how an EHR solution improves a practice's charting process:

1. A patient checks in for their healthcare appointment: When a patient arrives at the practice for an appointment, the receptionist enters or updates the patient's information within the EHR system, which includes insurance coverage and demographic data.
2. The healthcare provider accesses the patient's health records: Before seeing the patient, the provider uses the EHR to access the patient's records and review information from previous visits.
3. The healthcare provider then documents the patient visit: During or after the visit, the healthcare provider enters all information about the visit, starting with vital signs such as the patient's blood pressure, heart rate, and temperature. The healthcare provider also documents the chief complaint that resulted in the patient visit and their symptoms, as well as any physical exam findings and diagnostic results.
4. The healthcare provider creates a treatment plan: The healthcare provider documents the treatment plan within the EHR, which includes any necessary prescriptions or test orders.
5. Monitoring the patient's progress: After the appointment, the healthcare provider documents the patient's progress and response to treatment. They also document any updates that may involve other healthcare providers, such as referrals to specialists.

Key Benefits of Effective EHR

Private practices that take the time to investigate their EHR options and adhere to best practices when deploying an EHR solution are more likely to experience significant improvements within their daily operations. With the right EHR system in place, healthcare providers gain back more time to devote to patient care, while also increasing employee satisfaction with fewer hours spent in the EHR platform.

Integrated workflow processes

portals and mobile apps, enable patients to complete intake forms online, creating an improved patient experience while saving your staff time and effort.

Remote work capabilities

Healthcare providers often need to work in places other than their office. By using a cloud-based EHR system with safe and secure mobile apps, physicians have access to all patient information no matter where they are: in the office, on-call at the hospital or at home after hours. This level of access drives provider productivity and improves patient care.

For specialty practices it's imperative that the EHR technology aligns with their specific needs. Many clinicians using legacy healthcare systems are experiencing high rates of burnout, which can lead to employee turnover and diminished levels of patient care. According to the CDC in 2022, 46% of healthcare workers reported that they often felt burnout.² High stress levels among physicians and nursing staff are a major problem for private practices—burnout often leads to employees looking for new career opportunities.

In addition to nearly half of the healthcare workers surveyed often feeling burned out, the CDC reported that 44% of survey respondents said they were planning to look for a new job that year.

As the healthcare industry works to reduce burnout, the results of numerous studies have determined that administrative duties are a major factor. In a recent survey by HealthToday, 58% of doctors and 51% of nurses said that the amount of daily paperwork required to do their job was the second greatest contributor to their feelings of burnout.³

Even more concerning: A recent survey of more than 550 medical group owners conducted by MGMA revealed 75% report stress levels have gone up this year.⁴ According to survey respondents, intensifying admin burdens from third parties—including prior authorizations and payor audits—are to blame.
